This year we are seeing the launch of our own Place Plan, part funded with Town Council contribution, emphasis on a mix of Resident, Business and Council representation, giving a real time local shared voice in developing a going forward activity plan with focus in helping to improve our community with the added advantage of the provision of applying for external grant funding to carry out highlighted improvements.

This will be an information gateway that we can develop over time, giving our residents a much-improved service.

The job front is further encouraged by the opening of more business opportunity developments on Tir Llwyd Industrial Park, we have been working on the site development for a number of years, providing much needed value-added employment.

Town Councils are audited financially on a regular basis, and I'm very happy to report that this year end external audit proved 100% accurate with no discrepancies or observations for action, we thank our Town Clerk Dylan, for his hard work on auditory activities.

Our Staff, Dylan and Diane, work hard behind the scenes, they have done and continue to do a tremendous job and are a credit to the Council and our community, thank you to both of you for your hard work and dedication.

On behalf of the Town Council, I wish to extend my congratulations and our support, to our New Mayoress Louise. I wish her well and hope she enjoys her year of office.

Thank you to all residents for making Towyn and Kinmel Bay a diverse and fantastic place to live.

SECTION 1 – INTRODUCTION

This annual report sets out to inform the residents of Towyn and Kinmel Bay about the activities undertaken by the Town Council during the period May 2022 to April 2023. This report will contain a brief outline of the structure of the Council, an overview of the Council's activities throughout the last two years and a financial summary. The report also includes details of all the Town Councillors/County Borough Councillors, members of staff and how to contact the Council.

Wales faces a number of challenges now and in the future, such as climate change, poverty, health inequalities, jobs and growth. To tackle these challenges, we need to work together in order to give current and future generations a good quality of life, and we need to think about the long-term impact of the decisions we make today. We also need to bear in mind the impact that the Covid-19 pandemic has had on our residents and the local economy, and of course the impact of the recovery process over the next few years.

Included within this report, is the Town Council's 2022 -23 Well-Being Future Generations Report. The report is a requirement of the (Wales) Act 2015, and provides a legally-binding common purpose – (the seven well-being goals) – for national government, local government, local health boards and other specified public bodies. It details the ways in which specific public bodies must work, and work together to improve the well-being of Wales.

This report outlines how Towyn and Kinmel Bay Town Council has contributed to the seven well-being goals for the community of Towyn and Kinmel Bay. The report covers the municipal year from May 2022 to April 2023, during the Chairmanship of Councillor Geoff Corry.

SECTION 2 – TOWYN & KINMEL BAY TOWN COUNCIL

Towyn and Kinmel Bay Town Council was formed in 1974, following the re-organisation of local government and the disbanding of Abergele District Urban Council.

The Town Council comprises of three electoral wards of Kinmel Bay 1, Kinmel Bay 2 and Towyn. There are currently 15 Town Councillors, of which 4 are also Conwy Country Borough Councillors, representing a population of approximately 8500, and some 50,000 plus visitors in the summer season. Individual Councillor details are listed on Page 22.

At the head of the Council is the Chairman, who is elected annually from its serving Councillors. The current Chairman (2023 - 24) is Cllr Louise Formston, who is a resident of Towyn. The current Vice Chairman (2023 -24) is Cllr Louise Formston, who is a resident of Towyn.

Towyn and Kinmel Bay Town Council usually meet two or three times per month, except during August. The face to face meetings are held at the TKBTC, Community Resource Centre, The Square, Off Foryd Road, Kinmel Bay, Conwy, LL18 5BT, however as a result of Covid-19, all formal Town Council meetings are being held remotely. Please refer to 2023 -24 meeting schedule which can be found on Page 23 of the Appendices.

The Council's main duties include:

- Providing financial and administrative support in respect of all services delivered by the Town Council.
- Management and maintenance of the council office located at The Square, Off Foryd Road, Kinmel Bay, Conwy, LL18 5BT.
- Management and maintenance of Chester Avenue Community Woodland and Fordd Y Berllan Playing Field in Towyn.
- Ground Maintenance – Various sites within the Towyn and Kinmel Bay area.
- Maintenance of various planters throughout the community.
- Maintenance of various benches and picnic benches within Towyn and Kinmel Bay.
- Maintenance of 5 Community Bus Shelters in the Towyn and Kinmel Bay area.

- Managing bookings and diary for events held by residents and community groups at the Kinmel Bay Community Centre. This also includes support with invoicing and banking (undertaken F.O.C. as a Community Service).
- TKBTC staff undertake/manage the cleaning and the provision of cleaning materials for the Community Centre (recharged quarterly to Kinmel Bay Community Centre).
- Custodians of the War Memorial (St Mary's Church).
- Installation each year of Christmas lighting and Christmas trees in Towyn and Kinmel Bay.
- Annual Community Awards Event.
- Annual Community Skips Events.
- Provide support to local community groups via grants.

TKBTC has representatives on numerous community bodies within Towyn and Kinmel Bay, and the Town Council has strong links with its two primary schools (Ysgol Maes Owen and Ysgol Y Foryd).

The Community Council has looked to invest in more efficient and environmentally friendly use of energy sources during recent years which has resulted in a reduced carbon footprint and energy costs.

Examples

1/ The Town Council is working towards a paperless office transferring files from paper to electronic, where possible, and archiving older documents via the Record Office. The use of email as a form of communication has greatly increased and large documents are circulated via email rather than in paper copy with the Council's agenda.

2/ The Local Government & Elections (Wales) Act 2021 enables the council to hold Hybrid Meetings and use electronic forms of communications, which the council is happy to implement.

3/ Most new benches and picnic benches have been locally sourced/ manufactured, and are made from recycled UPVC.

4/ The Christmas Lights (tree lights and lamp post motifs) have been replaced with LED lights.

SECTION 3 – 2023 – 24 FINANCIAL SUMMARY

The Town Council has an Expenditure Budget of **£283,499** for the forthcoming financial year (**2023 - 24**). The Council's Precept has been set at **£254,069** with further money generated via a Solar Farm Grant of **£11,789**, together with income of **£9,355** raised from the provision of a range of services, including recharges, room bookings and the rent.

A summary of the main areas of the budget expenditure for **2023 - 24** are shown below:

The Total Income for the financial year is set at **£275,213 - (Including the Precept of £254,069)**.

(The above figures, are as at 4th January 2023, which is the date the 2023 -24 Precept figure was approved by the TKBTC Full Council).

The Town Council is subject to internal and external audits each year, to ensure that we manage public finances appropriately. The Council has achieved clear audits for a number of years, which demonstrates sound management and financial systems.

About this Report

Welcome to Towyn and Kinmel Bay Town Council's Annual Report for 2022/2023. This report outlines how the Town Council is striving to provide and improve services that are compliant with the Wellbeing of Future Generations (Wales) Act 2015.

The Wellbeing Future Generations Act 2015 is about improving the social, economic, environmental and cultural wellbeing of Wales. The Act places a duty on certain Community and Town Councils, to take all reasonable steps in meeting the local objectives included in the local wellbeing plan. It gives a legally binding common purpose – the seven wellbeing goals- for National Government, Local Government, Health Boards and other specific public bodies. It details the ways in which specified public bodies work, and work together to improve the wellbeing of Wales.

The Town Council are also required to comply with the Conwy and Denbighshire Public Services Board (PSB) Wellbeing Plan 2018-2023. This plan focuses on 3 priority areas:

People – Supporting good Mental Wellbeing for all ages

Community – Supporting Community Empowerment

Place – Supporting Environmental Resilience

They are also committed to 4 additional principles which support the priorities.

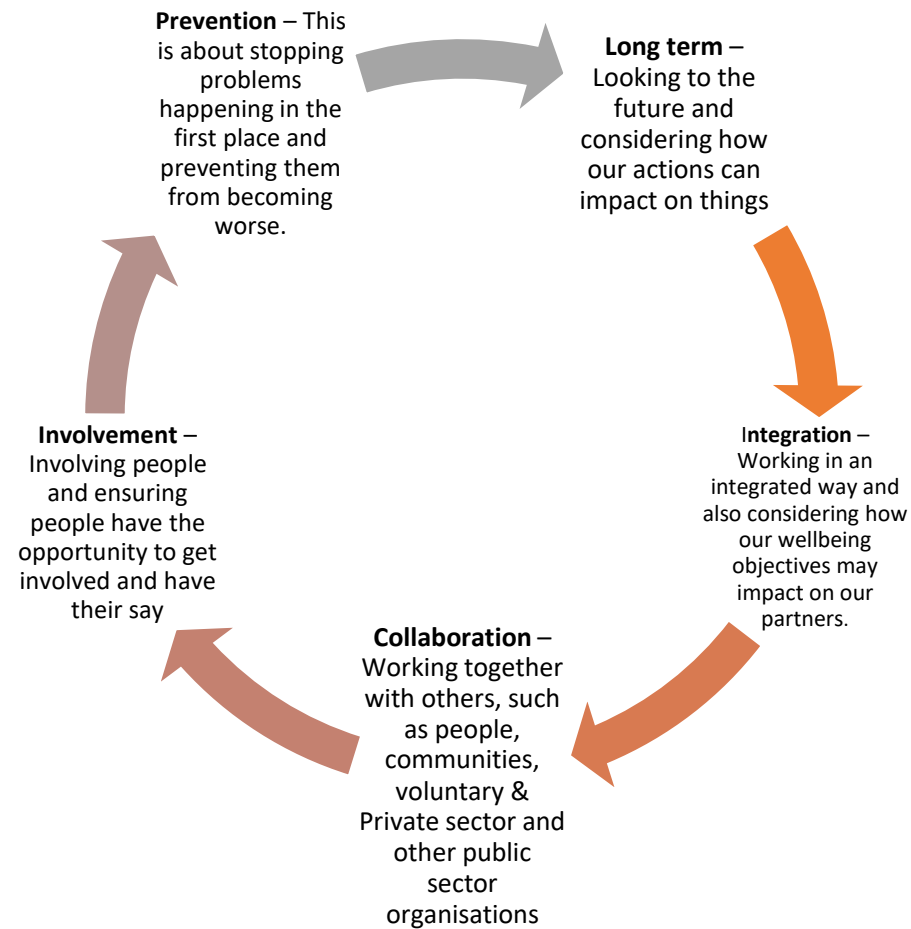

The challenge for the Local Council is to demonstrate how it can make a positive contribution to these priority areas, given that the objectives are strategically determined and of more relevance, to larger statutory bodies who can more effectively influence their progress. All local councils have their own local priorities, which are important to their own communities, and our ethos has been to work cohesively to support projects that make a meaningful contribution to the community and PSB plan.

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Context supporting Matrix

1. Community Support Contribution

Strong links with the community, and recognition of the difficulties facing some residents of Towyn & Kinmel Bay, has resulted in an increased demand on the local Food Bank situated at Kinmel Bay Church and the Hygiene Packs for St Mary's Church Towyn. TKBTC has purchased food and basic provisions to the value of £4,211.38.

2. First Response Engagement

TKBTC purchased a further two emergency community defibrillators in 2022, which have been installed at The Little Paddock Caravan Park (50/50 Funding with the owners of the caravan park) & Tir Prince Park. To date TKBTC have purchased a total of 7 Community Defibrillators, and 9 Secure Defibrillator Housing Cabinets. The majority of the Town Councillors & Employees have received basic CPR Training.

TKBTC manage, maintain and replenish the consumables of 9 Community Defibrillators located at Community Resource Centre, Kinmel Bay Church, North Coast Church, Old School Building (Benjamin's Tea Room), Sandy Cove, The Mayquay, Ogwen Avenue, Tir Prince Park & The Little Paddock Caravan Park. TKBTC also replenish the consumables of the Community Defibrillator which is located at Y Morfa Leisure Centre.

3. Community Library

The Community Library provides a key service to our residents, it's run by a part time CCBC staff member and number of volunteers (Friends of the Kinmel Bay Community Library). TKBTC contribute the sum of £3000 per annum towards the salary of the CCBC employee, to help maintain the Library Service.

4. Local Grant Scheme

During 2022-23 TKBTC awarded grants totalling £10,504.74 to local organisations and community groups. The Town Council also contributed £2,460.00 towards summer play events in the Towyn and Kinmel Bay area in 2022. During this financial year a number of TKBTC Councillors made the decision to forgo their Councillor Allowances. The amount of unclaimed allowances totalled £1,964.01, which was donated to various local organisations and groups.

5. Community Awards Scheme

A popular scheme which recognises individuals within the community who have made a contribution and/or a positive impact. In 2022 there were 13 nominations, of which all 13 received a Community Award and Certificate at our Community Awards Event which was held in October 2022.

6. Green Infrastructure

Both our local primary schools continue to hold open air class room sessions and litter picking events at the Chester Avenue Woodland. In 2022 a large bug hotel (hibernacula) was installed at the Chester Avenue woodland. TKBTC has continued discussions with CCBC & the Welsh Government regarding the WG land at Parc Hanes being an area of natural space, and the area has been included in the CCBC Replacement Local Development Plan.

A TKBTC Councillor has worked with Conwy Beekeepers and Greencoat Capital to establish a honeybee apiary on the Solar Park in Kinmel Bay, Conwy, North Wales, with a view to introducing a new green infrastructure on the site, this will involve specialised planting and the introduction of beehives to the site. This took two years to come to fruition and the honeybee apiary was set up during the summer of 2022.

In 2022 TKBTC have again sourced/planted additional trees in the Towyn and Kinmel Bay area (grass verges at Foryd Road, Sandy Cove Greens and the Clwyd Park & Owain Glyndwr Estates.

7. Climate Change

Community Skip Days/Environmental Educational Days have been held at Tir Prince Park, Kendal Road Car Park, Sandy Cove, Kinmel Bay Church Car Park, Chester Avenue & Glan Morfa Towyn. The Education Days cover things such as: The prevention of Fly Tipping, The Promotion of Pride in our Local Community, and The Importance of Protecting of our Environment. A total of six Community Skip Days have been held in 2022 – 23.

8. Community Skip Days

Community Skip Days/Environmental Educational Days have been held at Tir Prince Park, Kendal Road Car Park, Sandy Cove, Kinmel Bay Church Car Park, Chester Avenue & Glan Morfa Towyn. The Education Days cover things such as: The prevention of Fly Tipping, The Promotion of Pride in our Local Community, and The Importance of Protecting of our Environment. A total of six Community Skip Days have been held in 2022 – 23.

9. Speed Warning Signs

TKBTC supported CCBC by funding the cost of the procurement and installation of a two additional speed signs on St Asaph Avenue on either side of the railway bridge.

10. Tir Prince Park Projects

The Town council purchased a second fountain, as the initial fountain has been extremely well received/popular with residents and visitors alike. There has been a significant increase in pond life due to cleaner water and improved oxygenation.

TKBTC has again made improvements to the natural waterways within the park, which included the scraping back of the banks, the unblocking of the Tir Prince Park pond, and the removal of excess/overgrown algae and reeds.

11. Community Planting Scheme

A range of spring flowering bulbs have again been planted throughout various grass verges and green areas in both Towyn and Kinmel Bay, including the mass planting of crocus bulbs on St Asaph Avenue and Towyn Road.

12. Community Centre Support

In order to support the Community Centre with administration, TKBTC continues to manage the bookings and diary for events held by residents and community groups. This also includes support with invoicing and banking (undertaken F.O.C. as a Community Service).

TKBTC staff undertake/manage the cleaning and the provision of cleaning materials for the Community Centre (recharged quarterly to Kinmel Bay Community Centre).

13. Crime Prevention and Reduction

TKBTC contribute towards the running costs of the three Conwy County Borough Council CCTV cameras which are located within Towyn and Kinmel Bay.

TKBTC have a number of CCTV cameras to protect both the Community Resource Centre and the Kinmel Bay Community Centre.

14. Community Planter Project

TKBTC over the last few years purchased and installed a total of 24 planters (the majority of which are locally manufactured and environmentally friendly UPVC raised planters). The planters are located throughout Towyn and Kinmel Bay, and have been thoughtfully planted to enhance and brighten up local areas. Suitable plants have been identified, which are wildlife friendly, and attract/help pollinators to survive.

15. Town Christmas Project

TKBTC take pleasure to source and install the annual Christmas Trees and Lighting for both Kinmel Bay and Towyn. The Trees are located in prominent positions in each town, and the street lighting stretches approximately 3 miles through both Towyn and Kinmel Bay. The Town Council organised and funded a Christmas Reindeer event at the two local primary schools in December 2022.

16. Community Place Plan

TKBTC successfully established the TKBVoice Partnership Group in 2022 with the assistance of UK Government Community Renewal Grant Funding. This has been very well received by our local residents and visitors who were asked what they felt the T & KB area needs, to make it a better and healthier place to live. The Plan was completed on time and within budget (completed by 31/07/2022), and forms part of the Conwy County Borough Council Local Development Plan. Towyn and Kinmel Bay are one of the very first towns/communities in North Wales to complete a Community Place Plan.

17. Community Litter Pick Days

TKBTC Community Litter Picking Equipment (litter tongs, litter bags, litter Bag hoops, high viz vests and gloves), have again been used by a number of local schools/groups/organisations/individuals for litter picking events. This initiative has resulted in the promotion of local groups/schools/organisations and individuals taking/restoring pride in our local community.

18. Ground Maintenance

TKBTC continues to be responsible for the ground maintenance at Chester Avenue Woodland, Ffordd Y Berllan Playing Field and the Quarry Line Path. The Town Council financially supports and organises schemes of work at these locations, including planting, accessibility, clearing and general maintenance of any relevant gates, fencing etc. Also grass cutting initiatives in various locations within Towyn and Kinmel Bay.

19. Flag Pole

TKBTC flag pole continues to be used to commemorate/ acknowledge/ celebrate important dates (such as St David's Day and Remembrance Day), and also to acknowledge the excellent work undertaken by the NHS and frontline workers during the pandemic. The Town Council funded and installed three 'Lest we Forget' remembrance benches (2 x Kinmel Bay & 1 x Towyn) in 2022.

20. Bus Shelters

TKBTC continues to be responsible for covering the ongoing costs of maintaining and cleaning 5 Community Bus Shelters in the Towyn and Kinmel Bay area. These community bus shelters would have been removed by CCBC, if the Town Council had not agreed to take over the financial and maintenance responsibilities. The shelters are located at the following locations: - Kinmel Bay Community Centre, Chester Avenue and 3 x Towyn Road (outside Palins Caravan Park, Seagull Pub, and The Wendover Pub). The Town Council are presently in discussion with Conwy CBC, with a view to refurbishing the existing bus shelter at Chester Avenue, and replacing the existing shelters at Palins and Seagull, with green living roof bus shelters (to be part funded TKBTC/CCBC Grant Funding).

Conclusion

This report is a self-reflection of some of the progress we have made during 2022/23 notwithstanding the ongoing challenges and constraints that have faced us all with the restrictions the pandemic has created. We have continued to adapt our ways of working in order to continue to commit to the long-term social, environmental, cultural and economic wellbeing of our community. Aspirations for the year ahead are to continue to work together, and with the community, to focus on upholding the values of the Wellbeing of Future Generations (Wales Act 2015).
